

Wild Ones: Illinois Prairie Chapter 2019 Forever Wild Grant Program Instructions

In support of the Mission and Vision (<https://wildones.org/about-us/>) of Wild Ones, the Illinois Prairie Chapter is awarding grants to fund the purchase of native Central Illinois plants (not seeds). Please read the following instructions carefully *before* submitting a grant application. The document may not display properly on some mobile devices.**

Eligible Applicants

Applicants must be a school, college, nature center, library, house of worship, or other public or private not-for-profit agency. The project must be located within the following Illinois counties: Champaign, DeWitt, Ford, Grundy, LaSalle, Livingston, Logan, Macon, Marshall, Mason, McLean, Menard, Moultrie, Peoria, Piatt, Putnam, Sangamon, Stark, Tazewell, or Woodford.

The project site must also be owned by a not-for-profit entity in one of the counties listed above. If the project is to be located on property that is owned by a different non-profit entity, you must obtain permission from the landowner to use the property.

Contact Information

Here we ask you to provide the street address, city, state and zip code for your organization. If your application is successful, a check will be made out to your organization rather than to an individual within it. We also ask you to identify a contact person for your organization and to provide an email address and phone number(s) for them. This person is responsible for ensuring that grant funds are used appropriately and for submitting the final report. Youth groups such as the Girl Scouts or 4-H must have an adult as their contact person.

Eligible Projects

Projects must aim to preserve, restore, or establish native plantings on property owned by a non-profit organization, school, college, government entity, etc. Projects may include, but are not limited to, the following: Butterfly Gardens, Monarch Way Stations, Prairie, Woodland, or Wetland Plantings.

Applicants must demonstrate that their project has a reasonable chance of success. They must show that the project area will be prepared before planting in a way that is appropriate to their specific project. The native plants must also be appropriate to the local ecosystem in which the project is located and adapted to its micro-climate (sun, shade, etc.). If you are not sure if the plants you have selected are native to your local ecosystem, please visit: <http://illinoiswildflowers.info>. In addition, there must be a sound plan for maintaining the project area during the first planting season and in future years.

Finally, projects must serve to educate their intended audience about the benefits and beauty of native plants. Applicants must describe their planned outreach.

Eligible Costs

Funding will be provided for native plants only, not cultivars of native plants. At this time we are not funding the purchase of seeds.

Most projects will also incur other costs such as those involved in site preparation and its maintenance, instructional tools, hardscaping etc., but these costs are not eligible for funding.

Funding

The maximum annual award is currently \$500 per applicant. Checks will be made out to the non-profit organization applying, not to individuals within the organization. Funds are to be used in the year in which they are received. Receipts for purchases must be submitted with the final report. Successful applicants may re-apply for additional funding in subsequent years provided they have submitted their final report.

The Illinois Prairie Chapter of Wild Ones administers the funds, which are raised through chapter dues and fundraising efforts, especially its annual native plant sale.

Representatives of Illinois Prairie Wild Ones reserve the right to visit the site for which the grant funds were provided.

Applications

Applications must be submitted on the application form provided. Please respond to each question in the space below it. The space is expandable. Responses must be typed in a standard 12 point font, single-spaced with one inch margins. Please limit the length of the application to 8 pages excluding attachments.

Incomplete or late applications will not be considered.

The Forever Wild Grant Committee of the Illinois Prairie Chapter of the Wild Ones will evaluate all applications and will make recommendations to its Board, which will make the final award decisions.

Publicity

Successful grant recipients are required to acknowledge the Illinois Prairie Chapter of Wild Ones as a funding source in any project publicity or printed material.

Final Report

Grantees are required to submit a final report by February 15 of the year following the award. Go to <https://illinoisprairie.wildones.org/grants/> for an outline of the final report. The final report outline will be at the bottom of the page.

Project Timeline

Submit application by email	between January 15 and February 15
Notification to all applicants	no later than March 30
Submission of final report	February 15 of the following year
